Scoring: Assignments in this class will be weighted. The percentage breakdown is as follows:

Homework	10%
In Class Activities (Formative Assessments)	20%
Essays, Projects, Tests, etc. (Summative Assessments)	70%

<u>Late, Missing, or Incomplete Assignments</u>: Homework that is late will only be accepted one day late (it must be in by the beginning of the next day's class period) and for half credit. For example, if a 10 point homework is due Tuesday and a student brings it in Wednesday, that student will receive 5 points toward the homework. If it is more than one day late it will not be accepted.

If a major assignment is late, such as a project or an essay, 10% of the total grade will be deducted each day it is late. For example, if a student hands in a paper worth 30 points one day late then 3 points will automatically be deducted from the grade for lateness.

If an assignment is missing due to an **absence**, the student will receive one day for each day he or she is absent to make up the work and hand it in. For longer absences, the student must meet with me and discuss a plan for making up the work.

Second Chance Learning (SCL): If a student scores below a 70% on a major test or paper, the student may approach me in order to retake the test or rewrite the paper. To be able to benefit from SCL the student must first set up a time with me so that we may go over what was misunderstood.

Extra Help: If you are having difficulty with a particular aspect of this course, please seek me out for extra help. I am available to help you out after school.
